Launch of GLITF History

Peter de Waal from Sydney has written a history of the Gay and Lesbian Immigration Task Force, whose work since the mid-1980s has resulted in landmark changes to the Australian Government's treatment of same sex relationships in immigration matters. Peter's book, titled 'Lesbians and Gays Changed Australian Immigration: History and Herstory', will be launched in Melbourne on **Monday 6 May** at the Gryphon Gallery, 1888 Building, University of Melbourne, Grattan Street, 5 pm to 7 pm (formalities start about 6 pm).

Self-published by NSW GLITF, the 300 page book is based on 37 edited interviews with lesbian and gay Australians and their partners from overseas, early GLITF activists, bureaucrats, politicians and former and current immigration ministers (almost all since 1983) and shadow ministers. ALGA at Midsumma

ALGA's main contribution to Midsumma 2002 was a history walk run in conjunction with the Victorian AIDS Council, featuring the much-loved Dr Gertrude Glossop as tour guide. The event drew over 100 people, and from all feedback, it was much enjoyed. Dr Glossop, aka Will Sergent, led the walk on a route which took in St Kilda Road starting at the Floral Clock, over Princes Bridge to St Paul's, turning right at Collins and ending at Parliament House. The commentary may have had factual similarities with previous walks, but the delivery was uniquely Dr Glossop's, with a lovely balance of information, entertainment and outrageousness. She may be an Adelaide identity, but Dr G has an undeniable feel for queer historical Melbourne and we hope that she will do an encore in the not too distant future. ALGA also had a presence at Midsumma Carnival where we had many visitors. Sales of books and badges of which we hold triplicate copies helped pay for our expenses – thanks to Kym for enabling this. Esther's work on the photo albums and Kym's on the badges were able to be displayed, and these drew a great deal of interest. Clearly the visual aspects of our collection are drawcards and this is

something we would like to encourage further work on.

Acquisitions

Rodney Thorpe 1952 - 2002

The death of Rodney Thorpe earlier this year [6 January] has taken from us one of the founders of the gay liberation movement in Australia and one of its brightest stars. Over thirty years, his was an activism that fused politics, sex and pleasure in surprising – and remarkably effective – ways.

Rodney came to gay politics as one who had been touched by the radicalism of the 1960s and who saw immediately the value of a movement that applied the lessons of those earlier movements to 'people like us'. And he came to the movement in the nicest possible way. As he told me in an interview a few years ago, he was picked up as a 19-year-old by a man who was subsequently his best friend for twenty ears. And I quote: "on the head of the bed was this document, the gay liberation manifesto; so it was incredibly exciting. I got fucked for the first time and then I sat there I bed reading the Gay Liberation Manifesto."

Young, enthusiastic and passionate in his ideals, he took to the streets with the rest of the movement, joined in the debates and the arguments, wrote leaflets and organised dances. He spoke on radio and to school kids. They were, he said, "pretty wild times".

The times settled down, and in 1975 he moved to Sydney. He remained active in gay politics – in trade unions and then in the early days of the Mardi Gras (he was one of the first organisers of the cultural festival). He helped organise the community buyout of the *Sydney Star Observer*, which kept that paper from collapse, and in 1990 he was director of the first International AIDS Day, an event that was as much a celebration of survival as a commemoration of loss.

He was one of those who had sure his life made a difference.

52 up

This is the title in 2002 of the Archives popular column in *MCV*, Melbourne's weekly GLBT newspaper. Each column is devoted to a year, starting with 1950. Here's the 1951 number on 'Zasu Pitts'.

Today you mention Zasu Pitts and the mind flies immediately to the famous Hollywood comedienne of the forties. In Melbourne, in 1951, it was a very different Zasu standing in the dock in the Criminal Court. Harry Francis, also known as Zasu Pitts – Zas for short – was facing a murder charge, accused of pushing a man off Queen's Bridge.

In the early hours of 25 November 1951, Harry had met up with a friend Phillip Clark (Phyllis Calvert to his friends – another Hollywood star!), who had been to see the floorshow at the Galleon Coffee Lounge, a well-known haunt of bohemians and others of that sort, while taking a walk on the foreshore. They collected a bottle of wine from Zas' house, and were driving across Queen's Bridge, when they noticed a man straddling the parapet.

Zas jumped out of the car and went up to talk to him. From the car, Phil saw them talking until suddenly the man on the parapet disappeared over the edge. Zas' arms were outstretched.

As the car sped off, Zas told Phil that he had pushed the man in: "He wanted to jump, so I gave him some help."

A few days later, the body was pulled from the Yarra and Zas was arrested. In the end, there was so much confusion among ALGA Newsletter No. 17, April 2002

The Archives is the memory of the gay and lesbian community. We aim to preserve records of Australian homosexual life, past and present, for use by future generations.

The Archives has been going since 1978. The collection of periodicals is probably the core of the Archives' collection. But we also seek records of gay and lesbian life outside of organised groups, through personal letters, photographs and other memorabilia, including from times before there was a gay movement. We also encourage those with recollections of pre-movement days to record these for posterity through the Archives' Oral History Project. Requests for confidentiality are strictly adhered to.

You can support the Archives financially by becoming a member (\$20, \$5 concession), or by making a donation. All donations to the Archives over \$2 are tax deductible.

For those with the time and interest, you can contribute as a volunteer. There is a range of tasks to suit people's different talents and levels of commitment. For example:

- writing to groups around Australia to let them know about the Archives, and seeking their support
- ♦ listing and ordering parts of the collection that are of interest to you, eg. t-shirts, banners or posters
- taking care of the collection of a group that has special significance to you – ordering and listing that group's papers, maybe interviewing some of the people who are involved in running the group
- photocopying and ordering press clippings
- ♦ liaising with other collectors of gay and lesbian material, and arranging swaps of duplicate material
- helping with fund raising and organising major events (trivia nights, conferences etc)
- helping us distribute ALGA publications to bookshops
- writing promotional material to help raise awareness of the Archives
- arranging displays
- helping us solve the perennial problem of insufficient space.
